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
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Dear Residents,



Welcome to our Spring 2016 issue of the City Review. I appreciate you taking time to read our newsletter, which contains a good amount of information about what's happening in Seabrook.

Working with the Seabrook City Council, we have been moving forward in many positive ways. By far the impending SH 146 expansion project is on the forefront of your elected officials' and staff members' thoughts and actions each day. Each element of this project will impact Seabrook and how this city will function for decades to come. We would love for the quaint and quiet city we knew years ago to remain the same, but with our centralized location to entities to the south

and north of us, we have to look forward and make sure we mold our future carefully both economically and aesthetically.

We have been working on goals to bring forward distinct gateway, architectural and landscaping elements to the state highway project that will instill a new look that is completely different than our surrounding communities. A proposal will be brought forward by staff after a request for qualifications has been completed in the second guarter of 2016 for consideration.

At this time, the timeline given to the city by TXDot for right of way acquisition appears to be on track, and by this summer we fully anticipate final offers to be made on many of our businesses along the SH 146 corridor with subsequent demolitions to follow.

Our financial position is in great shape, and our fund balances are healthy as we move toward the TXDot construction phase approaching in 2018. Our responsible financial management practices have resulted in solid bond ratings and refinancing opportunities that saved our citizens hundreds of thousands of dollars. The city has prepared for this time with a Stabilization Fund and higher reserves to sustain service levels as new businesses replace those that will be displaced by the highway project.

We are Seabrook proud! We are fortunate to have an active and engaged elected body carrying our message and polishing our reputation with other officials in national and state organizations for all issues but especially transportation and mobility issues.

Quite simply, it is a great to be living in Seabrook. We can be proud to be residents of such a beautiful and respected city.

Charting the Course: Master Comprehensive Plan

For the past year Seabrook city staff, boards, commissions and Council have been diligently working on the city's Master Comprehensive Plan. The Plan provides goals, objectives, recommendations and action items for Seabrook's growth and development for the next 10-20 years.

IN MARCH OF 2015, the City of Seabrook initiated the process of updating the comprehensive plan with the assistance of a consulting team from, an urban planning firm, Freese and Nichols, Inc. A comprehensive plan is an official document that illustrates and guides how a city should grow in the future based on the needs and desires of it's community. It has been a year since the journey has begun and the last community update on the project was presented in July of 2015 at the Community Workshop. At the workshop, the public learned about the comprehensive plan and had the opportunity to give input on elements of the plan including: transportation and circulation; future land use; economic development and tourism; and community character. Through breakout groups, polling exercises, comment cards, and public input boards, the consulting team was able to collect data about the preferences of the community. Citizens also had the opportunity to participate in an online survey in which there were over 500 respondents.

From July to December of 2015, the Master Plan Review Committee (MPRC) and the consulting team met seven times. In September, the MPRC met to evaluate public input, and then in November, a Big Ideas Workshop

was held where the MPRC participated in exercises to determine what Seabrook should be in the future. Other meetings were held to begin drafting the future land use map, guiding principles, recommendations and to meet with community stakeholders. In February of 2016, the MPRC finalized the guiding principles representing six emerging themes from the community input, identified seven planning areas to focus efforts, and narrowed the list of recommendations to include in the comprehensive plan.

In the coming months, the consulting team is developing a complete draft of the comprehensive plan to be reviewed by the MPRC and receive comments. The MPRC will meet one last time to review the comprehensive plan before presenting the plan to City Council. The plan is anticipated to be adopted by City Council early summer of 2016.

The colorful activator incorporates a touch-activated sensor into a flower design.

Police & Technology

Policing today is like many other professions, where technology is no longer limited to an IT department or technology staff.


The Seabrook Police Department, like many other departments finds it necessary to use technology in its efforts to provide efficient and effective service to the community. Since 2013 the police department has increased its technology footprint.

Technology has been implemented in the operations of the police department in many areas. Within the last three years we replaced our entire radio system. The change from the previous analog 800 MHz Harris County radio system to the new Harris County digital system was started in 2013 and completed in 2015. The technology upgrade included new Motorola and EF Johnson handheld radios, Motorola vehicle radios, and the new dispatch operational software (Telex) and Motorola communications console.

This change was completed prior to the Federal Government's requirement for digital (P25) compliance. With the new change the department has increased communications capabilities, mobility and interoperability of the first responders, police, fire, and EMS.

In addition we have also upgraded our dispatching and record management software system. The software upgrade was made to SunGard OSSI, a shared operations and information system, that includes over ten local agencies that can share information and assist each other from their own terminals. The ability to share information, data, and incident response in real time is an effective tool during a critical incident. New mobile data terminal (MDT) laptop computers have been installed in all the marked police units and the Panasonic CF31 touch screen computers were implemented to run the new software.





The department has also upgraded their ability to record or capture information on patrol by the deployment of the new L3 HD video equipment installed in all patrol vehicles. The new video capabilities have been added to record traffic stops, provide evidence in court proceedings and to address state mandates on officers' contact with citizens.

The Seabrook Police Department is continually looking to provide technology as a tool to its personnel. Future additions in technology will include body cameras, automated fingerprint readers (that can operate from the field) and updated electronic ticket writers.

The Seabrook Police Department values the need for technology. Technology is something new police recruits consider when selecting a potential department as they understand and embrace technology. As the department reviews its technology needs it also reviews all of our funding sources, including grant opportunities and other partnerships that will keep cost low. The department actively seeks and has received grants for technology upgrades and purchases.



SFVD Open House

Join us at Fire Station #1 in Seabrook on Saturday, May 7th from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for a Seabrook Volunteer Fire Department Open House... we will be commissioning our NEW Fire Engine into service.



In November 2014 Seabrook voters passed Bond Proposition No. 2 to purchase a fire engine for the Seabrook Volunteer Fire Department. The new engine is here and will be replacing the 1994 engine. The impressive truck is a 2016 Pierce Velocity 2000 gpm pumper that carries 750 gallons of water, 50 gallons of Class B foam, 20 gallons of Class A foam and a compressed air foam system.

The engine is state of the art with the newest safety systems and front wheel independent suspension. Plus it is designed to transport five firefighters that will be fully deployed with air packs. As if that wasn't enough, the new truck also has special compartments to handle basic medical equipment, including an automated electronic defibrillator for the Seabrook Medical First Responder Program.

During the SFVD Open House on May 7th the City of Seabrook will commission into service the new fire engine, Engine 10. In addition, the SVFD will have present several demonstrations to the community so they will have a better understanding of what the SVFD does for Seabrook.



Our Public Works and Parks Department maintains over 200 acres of parkland that is connected by over 10 miles of Hike and Bike Trails. In addition, this department ensures that the city's roadways and streets are safe and clean while also providing a quality water and sewer system to residents and businesses. Recently, the Old Seabrook District and Waterfront District experienced several waterline breaks. The Public Works Department was quickly able to identify the problem and they limited the water outage to only a few homes and businesses in the area. By the way, our city parks are also award winning!

During the 2016 Warrant Roundup the Seabrook Municipal Court cleared 133 warrants with a total gross collected of \$26,367. Our Municipal Court totally rocks!

Construction for the SH 146 Expansion Project is quickly approaching and right-of-way acquisition for properties that will be impacted by the expansion are starting to be acquired by TxDOT. Both our Community Development and Economic Development departments have been diligently working with area businesses and developers to help assist any displaced businesses. New developments will create an opportunity for these businesses to stay in Seabrook.

Save Water this Summer


The City of Seabrook receives it's water supply from the City of Pasadena and is limited to 3 million gallons of water per day. Last summer the city had to enforce Stage 1 Water Restrictions because the city's water usage exceeded 2.55 million gallons of water per day, for five consecutive days. Help prevent us from entering into Water Restrictions this summer by doing your part to conserve water!





U.S. residents consume more water per person than any other country!








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Waste of water is equivalent to the annual flow rate of the Mississippi River







Producing 1 hamburger uses 2,400 litres of water = Water to fill 16 bathtubs.

6 easy ways to save water during the summer...

Lawn & Garden

Water before 8 a.m. or after 8 p.m.

Only water two days per week.

Don't water your drive-way or sidewalk.

Buy a rain sensor for your sprinklers.

Use mulch around flower beds.

Tame the Toilet

Leaky toilet tanks are huge water wasters. To detect a toilet-tank leak, remove the tank cover and add a few drops of food coloring to the water. Wait 30 minutes, then check the water in the toilet bowl. If it has turned the hue of your food coloring, then the tank is leaking. Repair or replace the flush mechanism.

Fix Faulty Faucets

A little drip may not seem like a big deal, but a faucet leaking one drop per second wastes about 2700 gallons of water per year!

You can easily stop leaky faucets without calling a plumber. Do-it-yourself faucet-repair kits are sold at most hardware stores and home centers.

Shorten your Shower

Be sure to shower instead of drawing a bath.

Shorten your shower by at least 5 minutes... better yet aim for a 5 minute shower!

Install a low-flow shower-head.

Smart Laundry

First, wash only full loads of laundry. If you must wash a partial load, adjust the water level to match the load.

Avoid the permanent-press setting.

When leaving home for vacation shut off the hot and cold water valves, just in case a hose ruptures.

Save in the Kitchen

Use the dishwasher and ensure you have a full load of dishes.

Don't thaw frozen food under warm running water.

Rather than boiling veggies in a pot of water, consider steaming them in the microwave.
