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Dear Residents,



Since being elected as your Mayor in May of 2017. Seabrook has not only endured a historical rain event with Hurricane Harvey, but we have also started to see the close of several cherished businesses due to the expansion of State Highway 146. As Hurricane Harvey recovery efforts continue locally and, in our region, the expansion of SH 146 will now start to have a major impact on our community. The closing of some iconic eateries such as Neptune Subs and Tookie's Burgers is truly heartbreaking, and I, along with the rest of the community grieve at these loses, but now it is time to move forward and develop Seabrook's future.

In May of this year, TxDOT will go into contract with a project and construction company that will manage the construction of the new highway. Construction is currently slated to begin during the last quarter of this year and will take between three and four years to complete. The Seabrook boat ramp will close when construction begins on the south side of Seabrook first and then construction will progress north. Unfortunately, the Seabrook boat ramp will not reopen; however, the City will continue to look for alternative options for our boating community.

With adversity comes success and the City of Seabrook and our Economic Development Corporation have been diligently working to find suitable locations for displaced businesses who have the need to relocate and reconfigure. Among these have been Mario's Pizza relocating to NASA Parkway; AutoZone and CVS Pharmacy both relocating to the Repsdorph Traffic Circle redevelopment; Blue Line Rental redesigning for their current location; and several other smaller businesses finding alternate locations in Seabrook. As demolition takes place, new development is also in the works along SH 146 for more businesses to relocate or for new businesses to come into the city.

The City and the EDC have also been working with TxDOT to implement unique and beautiful highway design standards that will help to enhance the seaside characteristics of our small town. These design standards will set Seabrook apart from other cities in our area and will incorporate Seabrook branding with eco-friendly additions such as trees and vegetation.

The City of Seabrook is about to launch a new website, www.SH146.com, that will be dedicated to keeping residents, businesses and visitors informed of all phases of construction. We currently have the site live with blog style updates on businesses that have already closed or relocated. Once the new site launches visitors to the site will be able to sign up for weekly construction updates, view traffic maps and much more.

For many, the expansion of SH 146 may be sad and even scary, but as your Mayor I want to ensure all of our residents that the Seabrook City Council and Seabrook City staff will work diligently for you. Together, we will get through these growing pains and we will see a bright and prosperous future.

Mike Giangrosso is running for At-Large Position No. 1 and has been a Seabrook resident for over 11 years and has lived in the Bay Area for 38 years. He has been married to his wife, Hilda for 20 years and they have two children, Clarissa and Craig. Professionally, Mike has worked in the hospitality industry for over 27 years.

Throughout his career in the hospitality industry, Mike has been known for his commitment to service excellence. Mike has served on the Seabrook City Council from 2011 to 2017 and has served on numerous committees and been involved in several different organizations. No stranger to the Bay Area, Mike has served this community for over 17 years.

Ed Klein is running for At-Large Position No. 1 and has been a Seabrook resident for 15 years. He retired after 40 years of service at the Boeing Company, with 25 years of engineering executive and program management experience. While employed, he was President of the Employee Community Fund and founder and President of the NASA/CCISD Robotics Booster Club. 
Flood Insurance

Can you really afford to NOT carry it?



Living in a coastal community and not having flood insurance is a bad idea. As we discovered during Hurricane Harvey, the water does not always come from Galveston Bay. It can also come from the sky in the event of 33.6 inches of rain in a four day period. With most of the City of Seabrook in the regulatory floodplain, mortgage lenders require, by federal law, to carry flood insurance to protect the loan. Now is the time to purchase flood insurance, if you have not already, because once the policy is purchased it will take thirty (30) days to take effect. The City of Seabrook participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NIFP) which will allow you to purchase flood insurance whether or not you live in a high-risk flood zone. As we can see from recent intense rain events like Harvey, you can flood anywhere whether inside or out of a known flood hazard area. Here are some reasons to buy flood insurance now:

- 1. Most people who live in NFIP participating communities, including renters and condo unit owners, are eligible to purchase federally backed flood insurance. A maximum of \$250,000 of building coverage is available for single-family residential buildings; \$250,000 per unit for residential condominiums. The limit for contents coverage on all residential buildings is \$100,000, which is also available to renters.
- 2. Spring flooding is in full effect and there is a 30-day waiting period before coverage begins.
- 3. If your community participates in the NFIP, you are eligible to get flood insurance even if you are located outside the 100-year flood plain.
- 4. You can receive payments for flood-related losses for over-land flooding even if no disaster was declared.
- 5. You can depend on being reimbursed for flood damages because NFIP flood insurance is backed by the federal government.
- 6. You do not have to repay flood insurance benefits (as you do with disaster-related assistance loans).
- 7. Renters can purchase flood insurance contents coverage for personal belongings or business inventory.
- 8. Basement coverage includes cleanup expense and repair or replacement of items such as furnaces, water heaters, washers, dryers, air conditioners, freezers, utility connections, and pumps.
- 9. You can request a partial payment immediately after the flood, which can help you recover even faster.
- 10. Buying flood insurance is the best thing you can do to protect your home and business, and your family's financial security, from a flood.

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Expanding Red Bluff

Plans to expand Red Bluff and add another bridge over Taylor Lake Village have begun. In addition, City officials hope to connect hike and bike trails east of SH 146 with Armand Bayou Trails.



THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (TxDOT) is expected to begin the expansion of Red Bluff Road between SH 146 to Kirby Drive by the end of 2018. The widening of this 1.5 mile track on Red Bluff will provide another hurricane evacuation route for residents.

The Red Bluff expansion will construct two eastbound traffic lanes and convert the existing roadway to a one-way westbound operation. The project will greatly improve the roadway on the existing bridge over Taylor Lake to include the addition of a new bridge parallel to the existing bridge. The existing bridge, located north of the new bridge, will be re-striped to two lanes of westbound traffic. The new bridge will include two lanes of eastbound traffic and a 10-foot wide pedestrian walkway.

TxDOT is planning to let the project in December 2018, with construction starting the first quarter of 2019. Construction will start at Kirby Blvd and will move east towards SH 146. Public Hearings for the project took place in December 2016 and TxDOT is now ready to move forward with the project. The project only requires 0.3 additional acres of right-of-way and no residents will be displaced for right-of-way acquisition.

Once the expansion is complete, the City of Seabrook hopes to connect the hike and bike trails east of SH 146 to the new pedestrian friendly access down Red Bluff, eventually connecting the Armond Bayou Trails to the Seabrook Trails

Once the construction is complete the Houston-Galveston Area Council along with state and local jurisdictions will more than likely identify Red Bluff as an official hurricane evacuation route. The expanded roadway will also be better equipped to handle future emergencies.


TxDOT does not believe construction will impact the SH 146 Expansion which is set to begin during the last quarter of this year. SH 146 construction is slated to begin on the south side of the city and move north and four lanes of traffic will remain open throughout the highway construction period.

SEABROOK PD RECEIVES \$28,000 IN GRANT FUNDING

LIKE MANY OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES, the Seabrook Police Department uses grant funds to assist in performing its public safety duties. In 2018, the Seabrook Police Department received grant funds to purchase rifle resistant ballistic vests and grant funds to upgrade facility video. Through HGAC (Houston Galveston Area Council), the department applied for and was awarded funds, distributed through the State of Texas Governor's office.

The ballistic vest grant will provide every sworn officer in the department a ballistic vest that gives added protection to the officer against higher caliber ammunition. The amount funded was \$15,200. The facility video grant will allow video upgrades throughout the police department, including their secured areas. The amount funded was \$13,000.

Chief Sean Wright believes the grant funded purchases will greatly improve the safety of his officers so they can better serve the community. The Chief understands it is a great benefit for police departments to work with HGAC to obtain grant funds, alleviating the need to use budget funds.






Waste Pickup Reminders

IN JANUARY THIS YEAR, the City of Seabrook enhanced the city's trash and recycling services provided by Waste Management. We have appreciated everyone's patience and understanding as we transitioned to new service days and added larger recycling carts. To ensure your service is not hindered or delayed, please be mindful of how you place your carts and large items on the curb. In addition, please be courteous and remove your cart from the curb as soon as you are able. Carts should not be left curb side for longer than 24-hours. Lastly, please ensure that you are recycling correctly.

7 am

Please have all your items curbside by 7am on your collection day.

Do not obstruct collection of carts or bulk items by parking vehicles in the vicinity.

Recycling goes into the cart with the yellow lid. Never put hazards inside carts. Always secure your cart's lid.

Place carts 2-3 feet apart and within 1-ft of the curb.






Bulk


Bulk pickup is now once per week on your scheduled day. You are limited to two (2) items.
